
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


BY ETHNIC POPULATION SERVED AGENCY WIDE



BY GENDER POPULATION SERVED AGENCY WIDE








HELPING FAMILIES SUCCEED

Child & Family Resources' Home Visitation and Family Support programs help prevent child abuse and neglect, and give children a solid foundation to start their lives. Mothers and fathers learn parenting and bonding skills to help create a loving, safe, and stable home environment, while learning about child development, and how to help their children to reach their full individual potential. Programs under Helping Families Succeed:

- Healthy Families Home visitation to improve parenting and child development
- Parents as Teachers Home-based parent education
- Arizona Early Intervention Program Home visitation and therapy services for children with developmental delays
- First Steps Providing information and referrals for new parents

COACHING CHILD CARE TEACHERS SO CHILDREN EXCEL IN SCHOOL

Child & Family Resources' Early Child Care and Education programs help prepare young children to be successful when they enter school. Child care providers and early educators can increase their knowledge and sharpen their skills through professional development opportunities, and on-site coaching and technical assistance, while resources are provided to help these professionals to build healthy and enriching environments for the children they serve. PARTNERING WITH TEENS TO ENCOURAGE HEALTHY BEHAVIOR

Child & Family Resources'Youth Development programs help to build the abilities, empowerment, and sense of usefulness and belonging that serve as protective factors to help shield youth from becoming involved in risky behaviors. In partnership with caring adults, young people learn the skills and confidence to become involved and productive contributors to their families, schools, and communities.
